Breakout Session Descriptions

Breakout Session 1 (11:00-11:45am)

Building an Engaged Scholarly Identity on a 4-4 Teaching Load (Room A)

Connecting to scholarly communities and conversations can feel like a luxury while teaching a 4-4 load, serving our departments and institutions, and producing our personal scholarship. But it's vital to a balanced and meaningful career, and, in this session, we'll talk about strategies for creating that balance.

Teaching First-Generation and Working Class College Students at Teaching Intensive Institutions (Room C)

First generation and working class students, a large proportion of the student population at teaching intensive institutions, bring diverse experiences and unique skills to their campuses. Drawing on their own experiences as first-generation and working class college students, as well as their efforts working with students from these backgrounds, the session leaders will discuss strategies for supporting their success. The session will include consideration of the roles of demystifying college, encouraging students to build social and cultural capital, and sharing a sense of belonging with first-generation and working class students.

Doing/Teaching Science at a Teaching Intensive Institution (LLR)

This interactive session will provide participants with experiences, examples, and tips for both doing and teaching science at teaching intensive institutions. We will share Discipline-Based Education Research (DBER) recommendations for bringing science topics to life in undergraduate labs and classrooms and will also share ways to stay engaged in your own science scholarship.

Breakout Session 2 (1:00-1:45pm)

Maintaining a Research Agenda at a Community College (Room A)

This interactive session will offer rationales and strategies for maintaining a research agenda while teaching at the community college. The session will present a model of research as a teaching tool, with an example of a successful implementation of an ongoing research project at the Community College level.

Teaching Engineering at a Teaching Intensive Institution (Room C)

The job description of faculty positions can vary widely across different disciplines and institutions. This session will provide an overview of faculty life at a teaching intensive institution, with a focus on engineering programs.

Surviving and Thriving a 4:4 Load – the role of Teaching and Learning Centers (LLR)

Centers for Teaching and Learning on campuses can be a great resource to help prepare your classes, learn strategies to improve your teaching, and generally survive the teaching load. In this session, we will discuss ways to maximize your teaching time and utilize CTL's to their best advantage.
