The University of Massachusetts Amherst is a coeducational, major public research university located in a beautiful, culturally rich New England town. As a public university, UMass offers an excellent education at an affordable price. Its size, diversity, and the richness of its academic and extracurricular offerings, provide almost unlimited possibilities for personal growth and professional development. A distinctive feature of UMass is the opportunity for undergraduates to become directly involved in research, and get hands-on experience in numerous areas through internships or field experience. UMass also offers a wide range of service learning and volunteer opportunities. Academically talented students may participate in the Commonwealth Honors College that offers both the advantages of a small honors college and the wide-ranging opportunities of a nationally recognized research university. ### 9. New England Regional Student Program (NERSP)

NERSP students from Connecticut, Maine, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, and Vermont enrolled at UMass Amherst pay 75% above in-state tuition, rather than out-of-state tuition, if they choose a qualified major not offered in their home state. Full-time NERSP students pay \$21,876 in tuition and fees, rather than the out-of-state rate of \$28,813.

### 2. Computer Facilities

The campus offers centralized computing services through the Office of Information Technologies (OIT). All matriculated students are required to have an OIT account. This account provides students with access to: a campus wide network accessible from residence halls, public buildings and off-campus, an email account, the campus online course management system, and the campus wireless network. Registration, grades, and student information are available online. The campus also offers tools and training to faculty who wish to integrate technology into their curriculum.

### 3. Study Abroad

The University offers more than 550 domestic and international exchange programs in over 65 countries to more than 700 students each year. Programs are available in Africa, Asia, Australia, Canada, Caribbean, Ireland, Latin America, Russia and East Europe, Western Europe, Scandinavia, and the United Kingdom.

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### 5. Special Academic Programs

Commonwealth Honors College, an honors college, offers a dynamic curriculum, including interdisciplinary seminars, enriched honors courses, and opportunities to link academics and community outreach. It offers students a small college environment with the resources of a major university. Commonwealth Honors College resources include special housing opportunities, a computer laboratory, and academic support services, such as the Office of National Scholarship Advisement which assists students applying for prestigious fellowships. Also, students can participate in undergraduate research with the opportunity to present their work at an annual academic conference.

Unique majors include the *Bachelor's Degree with Individual Concentration*, through which students may design their own interdisciplinary major under faculty guidance.

University Without Walls (UWW) – This program offers non-traditional students an opportunity to earn flexible, individually designed B.A. or B.S. degrees which can be interdisciplinary in nature.

Residential Academic Programs (RAP) allow students to combine living and learning experience through residentially based academic programs. They include Arts & Humanities, Careers in Education, Social Justice, Sustainable Environment, and TAP (Talent Advanced Program) in a variety of disciplines.

Other academic opportunities include national and international student exchange programs, internships and opportunities to engage in community service through a growing number of service learning courses in academic departments.

Students can enroll at no extra charge in courses at Amherst, Hampshire, Mount Holyoke, and Smith Colleges through the *Five College Consortium*. The five colleges have open library borrowing, meal exchange, and a free bus system linking the campuses.

### 3. Popular Campus Events

UMass Amherst abounds with opportunities for everyone to experience the arts. Students may enjoy an exhibit at one of the on-campus galleries or a performance at one of several venues. They may take in a concert, off-Broadway show, experimental theater production, or a Friday night film. Special events include first-run movies, comedian and other live performances, First Week (a week-long celebration that kicks off each academic year), Festival of the Arts, Multicultural Film Festival, Haitian, Dominican, and CASA Cultural Night, Jazz in July, and Magic Triangle Jazz series. UMass Amherst sports events are free of charge with student identification. Students can attend Center Series Events at the Fine Arts Center for as little as \$10, and many shows at the Mullins Center sports arena offer student discounts. Downtown Amherst, just a short walk from campus, was recently named the top college town in the country and has restaurants, movies and shopping. The Five College Consortium (Amherst, Smith, Mt. Holyoke and Hampshire Colleges) offers additional opportunities off-campus for experiencing the arts.

## 7. Support Services for Minority Students

**Center for Multicultural Advancement and Student Success (CMASS)** - A learning resource center focused on partnerships, resources and advocacy for underrepresented minority students, CMASS is comprised of four integrated functional areas: academic support, student development, cultural enrichment and institutional diversity. Four freestanding cultural centers offer a range of activities highlighting the similarities and celebrating the differences of various cultural groups.

**Multicultural Engineering Program (MEP)** - MEP recruits traditionally under-represented minority students through visits to high schools in Massachusetts and college fairs nationwide, and by hosting an annual career day for high school students. To support students once they enroll in the UMass Amherst College of Engineering, MEP provides academic advising, tutoring, mentoring, and financial aid counseling. **Stonewall Center** - For almost three decades, the Stonewall Center has provided LGBTQ-related programs, training, information, referrals, advocacy and outreach for UMass Amherst and surrounding communities. In 2013, the university was recognized for the third consecutive year as one of the top 25 campuses in the country for LGBTQ people by Campus Pride, a national support and advocacy organization; UMass has also been rated among the nation's top 10 friendly colleges and universities for transgender people. Policy: All non-veteran students are required to live on campus through their freshman year unless they are living with family within a 40-mile radius. Students may choose traditional residence halls, suite-style residence halls, apartment style halls, 12 month housing, the sorority/fraternity system (during their sophomore year), and (if qualified) family housing.

**Residential Life** offers seven defined residential communities for students seeking to live with others who share their interests, background or world views:

- **Nuance Multicultural Student Community** - An inclusive, socially just living and learning environment based on mutual respect among persons of diverse and multiple identities.
- **The Asian/Asian-American Student Community** - Designed for Asian and Asian-American students, and others interested in Eastern cultures. Residents explore issues of identity, leadership, belonging and college life in this era of global migration, media and capital.
- **Harambee African Heritage Student Community** - Unites students who identify as African or wish to learn more about African history and culture.
- **Kanonhsesne Native American Student Community** - Brings together Native American students and others interested in native cultures. Residents have the opportunity to affirm their identities while learning about the customs and traditions of other tribal nations.
- **Spectrum LGBTQA Community** - Supports the rights and needs of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer people and their allies. Campus collaborations, programming and other initiatives foster connections while seeking to eradicate genderism and heterosexism.
- **Wellness Community** - Members of the Wellness Community create a safe, healthy, inclusive community, living an alcohol- and drug-free lifestyle and engaging in programming supporting all forms of wellness.
- **The Veterans Community** - Supports students transitioning from military to academic life, through programming resources and a supportive, peer-oriented residential environment.
