Note D. In 2010 federal race/ethnicity standards changed, allowing individuals to specify more than one race, as well as splitting, renaming and adding categories. Because of these changes, data from fall 2010 forward are not comparable to previous years.

Note E. URM (Underrepresented Minority) includes American Indian/Alaska Native, Black/African American, Hawaiian/Pacific Islander, Hispanic/Latino, and those who declared multiple race/ethnicities (except Asian and White).
