Here are some facts, statistics, and resources to help people better understand and prevent suicide in general and within the LGBTQ community in particular.



Suicide Facts

- About 30,000 Americans die through suicide each year.
- The number one cause of suicide is untreated depression.
- Suicide rates are higher in the spring
- Four men commit suicide for every woman who does so. Women are more likely to make suicide attempts that result in hospitalization but not death.

Suicide Facts

- Overall, there are 25 suicide attempts for every successful attempt.
- It is estimated that for every adolescent who completes suicide, there are between 50 and 200 teens who attempt it.
- Suicide is the 11th leading cause of death in the U.S., but the 3rd leading cause for teens.
- Everyday, there are approximately 11 youth deaths caused by suicide.

LGBTQ Suicide Facts

- Teenagers who identify as LGBTQ are three times more likely to commit suicide than heterosexual and cisgender (nontransgender) teenagers.
- A study conducted by the Suicide
 Prevention Resource Center found that 30-40% of LGBTQ youth have attempted suicide.
- Suicide is the leading cause of death for LGBTQ youth.

LGBTQ Suicide Facts

- Gay men are six times more likely to commit suicide than heterosexual men.
- Lesbians are twice as likely to commit suicide than heterosexual women.
- Suicide attempts by LGBTQ teens are more common in politically conservative areas, where schools do not have LGBTQ support programs.

Triggers for Suicide

- Depression
- Relationship difficulties
- Family history of substance abuse or mental disorder
- Family violence
- Unemployment
- Social Isolation
- Bullying

Warning Jigns that Jomeone May Be Contemplating Juicide

- Substance abuse
- Anger
- Hopelessness
- Anxiety
- Preoccupation with death
- Suddenly a happier person



Be the Hand that Helps to Prevent Suicide

- Be willing to talk to someone who is suicidal
- Ask questions, begin a non-judgmental dialogue
- Offer to help
- Offer to find them professional help
