10. Walk for Justice

Saturday, Sept. 19

Walk starts at 10 a.m. from Haigis Mall and the event ends around 1:30 p.m. at Sweetser Park, downtown Amherst

"The 5k-Walk For Justice - organized by the Amherst National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) and co-sponsored by the Women of Color Leadership Network at the Center for Women & Community, along with other UMass and local organizations - has the purpose of developing a multi-racial, multi-age group of thousands of people who will participate in some leg of the Relay to demand legislative changes in policies and practices in the police forces. These changes may lead to better and more effective policing and the elimination of race based policing and discrimination against the disabled. The Relay will endeavor to gain the sponsorship and active support of significant numbers of civil rights organizations, religious groups, community groups and unions."

11. LaMonda Horton-Stallings, "Funk The Erotic: Transaesthetics and Black Sexual Cultures" Tuesday, Sept. 22, 4:30-6 p.m.

UMass Integrative Learning Center, room N231

"Join us on Tuesday, September 22nd for a lecture and discussion with Professor LaMonda Horton-Stallings (University of Maryland, College Park), author of the new book, *Funk the Erotic: Transaesthetics and Black Sexual Cultures. Funk the Erotic* brings together queer theory, black feminist theory, pop cultural analysis and literary studies to explore multiple dimensions of black erotic and political life. Using funk as a theoretical tool, Stallings argues that Western theories of the erotic fail as universally applicable terms or philosophies, and thus lack utility in

discussions of black bodies, subjects, and culture. In considering the Victorian concept of "the freak" in black funk, Stallings offers a needed examination of black sexual cultures, an expansion of ideas about black eroticism, sex work, pornography, and black trans narratives, a critique of work society, a reexamination of love and monogamy, and an articulation of the desiring body in black political and cultural movements."

12. Kat Zubko (University of Memphis), "Trans* Bodies at the Limits of Intelligibility" Thursday, Sept. 24, 5 p.m.
Seelye Hall 201, Smith College

"Under what conditions do transgender bodies become intelligible? Bodies that have undergone some kind of medical intervention (surgeries, etc.) become publicly disclosed as trans bodies, while trans bodies that have not undergone medical treatments are not considered intelligible as trans* bodies. Kat Zubko seeks to elucidate this problematic subjectivation through medical procedure, which is often the only way that transgender bodies become intelligible in our current U.S. context."
