## How Can I Train My Dog So They Won't Pull On The Leash?

Although it takes a while, teaching your dog to walk on a leash is worth the effort in the end. Here are some tips for training your dog by yourself:

### 1. Use Positive Reinforcement from the Start

Of course you want to take your furry friend out on walks, but be sure to bring along some snacks or a toy. Every time they display the good behavior of staying by your side without pulling, give them either a treat or verbal praise. It's essential that you also keep the initial walks short and then gradually increase the duration as they learn correct leash manners.

### 2. Pryor Leash Training Exercises

You can train your dog several tricks while on a leash, such as the "watch me" or "come here" commands. This will help your pup understand that he needs to pay attention to you and stay by your side. You can practice these exercises both inside and outside of the house, but it is important to remember To keep rewarding positive behavior with treats or belly rubs.

### **3. Stop Your Dog From Pulling on the Leash**

You may be unhappy with your current dog-walking situation, but try using different equipment - it just might help! The right harness puts physics on your side so that your dog can't pull you along as easily. With the proper gear, you'll both be able to enjoy walks together much more.

Some leashes have an elastic section which allows it to extend, but if your dog is particularly strong or doesn't respond well to that type of leash, I suggest using a plain nylon or leather leash that's six feet long.

### **4. Stay in Control During Your Movements**

If you don't correct your dog's pulling behavior, they will believe that is the way to get what they want. Dogs who are allowed to continue on their journey without being disciplined will never stop Pulling. You have two options when your dog pulls:

- If your dog pulls on the leash, stop immediately. Do not start walking again until there is slack in the leash. You might have to stop multiple times, but being consistent is key to preventing pulling.

If your dog is pulling on the leash, turn around and walk in the other direction. This will put them behind you for a moment and they won't be able to pull.

Don't get discouraged while training your dog with either of these methods - it'll be worth it eventually! You should always act unpredictable, even when the dog isn't pulling. This way, you're more interesting to them and they're more likely to follow you instead of lead you around.

## **5. Get your dog some exercise before taking them on a walk.**

While walking your dog does provide them with exercise, it also offers other benefits such as exposing them to new environments and stimulating their senses more than being at home would.

Dogs rely on their sense of smell to detect people and animals, so it's important to teach them how to walk calmly on a leash. Exhausting your puppy before the walk begins will only make it more difficult for them to follow directions. Walking properly.

Just make sure that the rewards are tantalizing enough for them so that they really want it. For example, choose something soft and stinky over dry biscuits any day.

## **7. Get Your Dog to Thrive**

If you want to help your dog behave correctly, start by making it easy for them. Give them tasty treats as reinforcement and make sure they get plenty of exercise. Taking other measures will also help your dog succeed.

The time of day you walk your dog makes a difference. Your dog is likely most excited to go on a walk in the mid-morning or late afternoon, but they are calmer closer to dawn or later at night. If possible, take them on an out-and-back route instead of a loop; dogs usually pull more on the way out since they're investigating

everything, but tend to be better behaved walking back because they're familiar with smells and sights by that point.
