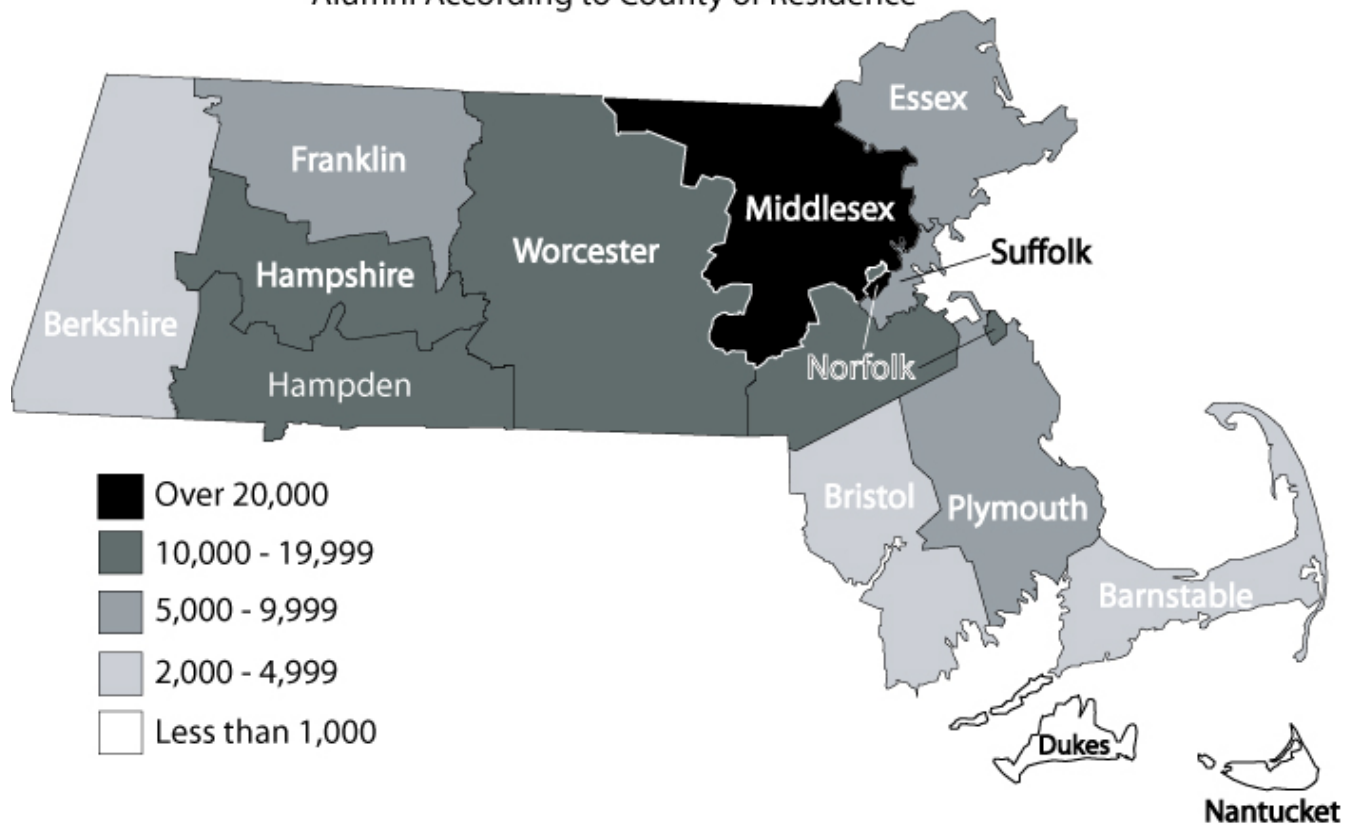

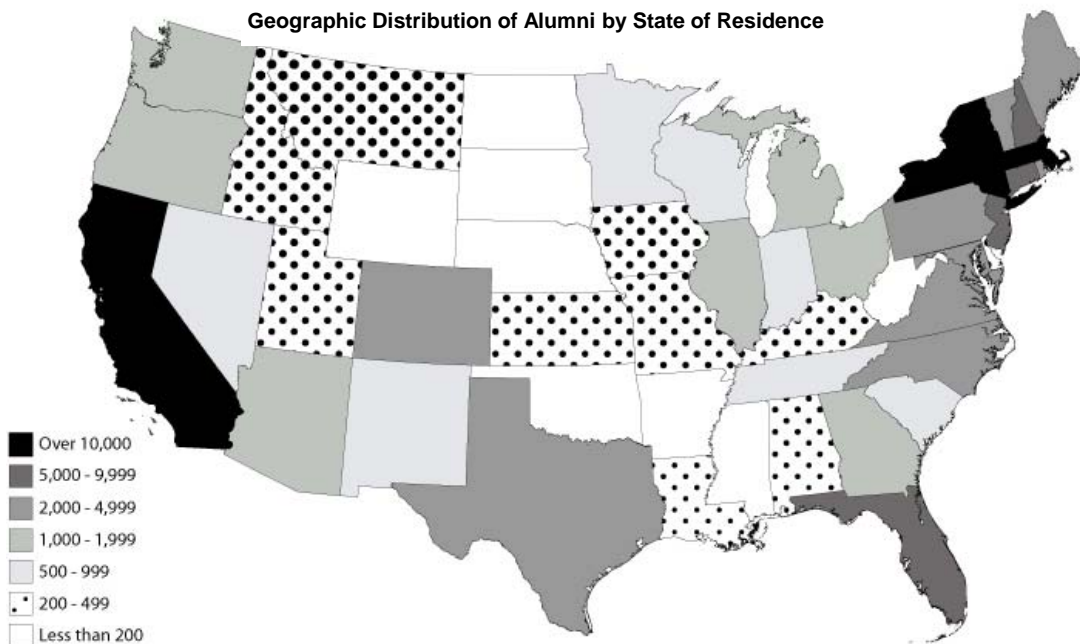
Geographic Distribution of In-State Alumni According to County of Residence
