#### **Class Policies**

#### Communication

 We will be using the university emails (\_\_\_\_\_@umass.edu) and Moodle for course-related communication. Therefore, it is important that you check both regularly for class announcements and/or any additional (pertinent) material.

- O Class will begin at 6:00 pm: attendance will be taken at 6:00. If you arrive after attendance has been taken, you will be marked late, unless you have contacted the officers & Dr. Marston beforehand and provided a legitimate excuse for being late. Every 3 late arrivals will be counted as an unexcused absence.
- Documented absences, such as a note from a physician, may be excused. However, you must contact the officers & Dr. Marston within 48 hours of the absence to receive instructions about completing any missed assignments or exams.

## Health & Human Safety

- Coveralls and boots must be worn while in direct contact with the goats (or any other animals) at the UMass farms. If you are a VASCI student you are required to bring your own coveralls and boots. If you are a non VASCI student, there are a few extras that you may borrow throughout the semester. Make certain your personal belongings are labeled with your name or some other easily identifiable way. Coveralls will be laundered on site for you. Boots can be either over-the-foot or over-the-shoe, but they must be able to be sanitized with a Clorox solution ("bleachable"). Wear clothing you don't mind getting dirty.
- O If you have a compromised immune system, are pregnant, or likely to become pregnant, we ask that you stay out of the barn for safety/health reasons.
- O A "goat buddy" is required whenever you interact with the goats. Animal behavior can be unpredictable; therefore livestock barn policy requires that another student or staff member be present in the event of injury or accident.

#### Animal Care Training

The Animal Welfare Act, the Public Health Service Policy on Humane Care and Use of Laboratory Animals, and the Guide for the Care and Use of Laboratory Animals require that Institutions ensure that all personnel caring for, treating or using animals are qualified to perform their duties. All UMass Amherst animal users, including students in Boer Goat Management, are required to attend a one-time general training course prior to working with animals. If you previously attended a training session at UMass, you will not need to do so again.

\*\*Students found to be in violation of any of the aforementioned rules will be asked to leave the premises.

## **Frequently Asked Questions**

- **1. How do I get credit for Goat Management?** Students must register for Animal Science 297S, which is a <u>two credit</u>, <u>graded</u> course that can be repeated for credit, spring only.
- **2. Is there an expectation for "Off Hours" work?** Yes!! Barn checks and weekend chores are also an expected part of your participation in the class. You, along with several other students, will be assigned an animal to care for before, during and after kidding. Preparation and participation in kidding and follow-up neonatal care is a mandatory part of the course.
- 3. I don't have a car...How do I get down to the barn for meetings, barn checks and/or weekend chores? There are car pools that transport students down to the Hadley Farm. If you need a ride to the weekly meeting: WE LEAVE THE ISB PARKING LOT PROMPTLY AT 3:45PM! We will make arrangements for transportation for "off hour work" by student car-pools. The officers can pick people up for barn checks and weekend chores if necessary. However, 24 hours advanced notification is required!
